National Institute of Health Awards \$2.5 Million Dollar Grant for Cochlear Implant Study

The Children's Hearing Institute is proud to announce that The New York Eye and Ear Infirmary has been awarded a 2.5 million dollar grant by the NIH – National Institute on Deafness and other Communication Disorders. This prestigious grant will fund research led by Dr. Richard Schwartz, who had been conducting preliminary research (funded by The Children's Hearing Institute) at the Cochlear Implant Center for the past several years.

Dr. Schwartz, who is the Presidential Professor in Speech-Language Hearing Sciences at The Graduate Center CUNY, will collaborate with Dr. Derek Houston, Associate Professor at Indiana University School of Medicine, and Elizabeth Ying, SLP, of The Ear Institute at New York Eye & Ear.

The research, to be conducted over the next five years, will investigate how children with cochlear implants acquire language compared with their nor-

mal-hearing peers. It is anticipated that the findings of the study will help improve approaches by therapists as they evaluate and work with very young children with cochlear implants, optimizing the way they learn speech and language. The grant will utilize control groups consisting of normal hearing children (ages 5-11) and children with cochlear implants (ages 7-11). Audiologist Travels to Ethiopia with Mission to the World

Audrey Morrison, AuD, clinical and educational audiologist at The New York Eye & Ear Infirmary's - Ear Institute, recently spent a week in Ethiopia as a volunteer with "Mission to the World," an international organization dedicated to providing medical and clinical care to individuals with HIV/AIDS. She was part of a team of 15 doctors, nurses and other medical professionals.

Dr. Morrison worked with a pediatric population providing basic hearing healthcare, including ear examinations and cleanings, identifying infections and making referrals to team physicians.

In addition, Dr. Morrison dispensed hearing aids, donated by The Children's Hearing Institute, to two children with HIV. Their hearing loss was induced by strong dosages of retro-viral drugs used in the treatment of HIV/AIDS. The hearing aids have enabled the children to hear and detect some sounds.

"We are blessed in New York with having access to excellent health care. My trip to Ethiopia made me fully realize this. It was a privilege to be able to help," commented Dr. Morrison.

Early hearing loss detection through newborn hearing screenings allows infants who are 3-4 weeks old to be fitted with hearing aids. Unfortunately, children from low income families are unable to purchase these hearing aids due to finances or insurance restrictions. Donations from this event will provide these children with early amplification transitioning them from a world of silence to a world of sound.

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Music Workshops Conclude a Successful Season

For the past several years, The Children's Institute had funded music workshops for teen and elementary students with hearing loss. The program is led by Casey Cheffo, who holds degrees in both special education and music.

Many deaf children don't get to explore their musical creativity in the same way that their normal-hearing peers do. With CHI's free music workshops, both teens and elementary students meet to explore popular music and build important friendships. Students work on building listening skills and interpreting songs from their own iPods.

During the workshops, parents are invited to attend parent education and support groups. These sessions are designed to answer questions and concerns, share information, and build a support network for parents of children with hearing loss.

Inaugural Meeting for Teachers of the Deaf Study Group

The Children's Hearing Institute is dedicated to supporting all professionals who work with children of hearing loss, and is happy to announce a new study group for Teachers of the Deaf (TODs), Speech Language Pathologists, (SLPs) and Audiologists.

Many TODs work as itinerant teachers in mainstream school settings, moving from school to school to observe students with hearing loss, and make recommendations for their educational achievement. Their work is an essential component in providing a fair, successful education to children with hearing loss in a mainstream setting.

Due to the nature of the work, these dedicated professionals are often unable to meet with other TODs or other professionals working with the student to discuss issues and share information. Under the sponsorship of The Children's Hearing Institute and the leadership of Educational Audiologist Rebecca Kooper, AuD these professionals have begun to meet monthly to discuss vital information about deaf education.

"This is a wonderful way for professionals to meet and exchange information and ideas," says Dr. Kooper. "In the end, the children those teachers help will benefit from the knowledge and experience gained during these meetings."
